PLYMOUTH UNIVERSITY VISIT AVANTI...

On 24th May a group of seven 2nd year trainee teachers from Plymouth University visited Avanti as part of a 3 day visit to London. The aim of the trip was to give students a range of experiences in relation to the diversity of faith, culture and educational models as they could hope to experience in the capital.

Students were warmly welcomed as they toured the school before joining in with the morning act of collective worship - an experience that all enjoyed and took inspiration from. This was followed by observations of morning lessons before lunch was shared with the children and staff. Afternoon lessons were observed in different classes before an enjoyable and stimulating discussion with school staff on the journey of Avanti Court, faith schools and employment and practicalities of working in the borough.

The students were engaged and enthusiastic about life in your school, and for some this was a day that gave them new knowledge and experiences. Now decisions need to be made about their future study and career. The students have the option to take a teaching placement in Redbridge during their 3rd year, and for some, after the day spent in your school, this now seems a great opportunity. Students also visited London Central Mosque, Neesden Hindu Mandir, St. Paul's Cathedral for evensong, Chinatown, a west end show and The British Museum. The school visit was the highlight of the trip – thank you for making us all so welcome.

Governors' corner - budget process

Hello, as part of Avanti Court Governors trying to give parents further insight it to the workings and responsibilities of the governing body (GB) we thought we would share with you how the budget process works.

Every year the school needs to prepare and have this approved for the coming year. As an academy the year now runs from September to August, where as when we were under local authority reporting this ran from April to March.

The budget effectively revolves around two main factors, how much money will the school get and where is best used. The process is started of by the school under the framework provided by the Avanti Schools Trust (AST).

How much money will the school get?

This is largely determined by the Education funding Authority (EFA) who will supply us with the information of how much they will give us over the coming year and involves considerations such as projected pupil numbers, how many students have English is an additional language plus other factors. Other sources of income include nursery income which is still obtained from our local authority and income from lunches. The school and GB also look at obtaining funds through grants and awards on going basis but these are not factored into the budget because it is not certain we will get such funds

Where are the funds best used?

during the budget process.

As a growing school currently we know at present we need to open 4 new classes next year, so extra teachers and teaching assistants needs to be factored in, coupled to this is looking at the overall staff structure and changes that may be needed for the additional 120 children expected to start in September.

Other costs will also be reviewed in light of how much is being spent on them currently together with areas that need changes in resources and other requirements that have developed or will develop over the coming year.

Of course as a prudent measure we keep some funds for contingency purposes.

Review and challenge process

The budget is bought to the Finance and Premises Committee for review/challenge and approval. This year we discussed it in two separate meetings, firstly looking at the additional staff recruitment in terms of why and the costs. Then second time we reviewed the whole budget. The budget is compared to the current year projected spend in order to see it makes sense, what areas are going and why. Questions and issues discussed with supporting information requested where required.

Once approved the budget is taken to the GB meeting for approval where once again there is opportunity for all GB members to review and challenge the budget. After approval is taken to AST for approval and incorporation into the AST's budget which is submitted to the EFA.

AST are involved in the process throughout the cycle.

What happens after?

However the work does not stop there, the school produces monthly accounts to show actual spend and comparing it to budget which is sent to AST, Finance and Premises Committee. Updates will be given to GB as and when required.

STAYING SAFE DURING THE SUMMER HOLIDAYS...

If you go to stay with friends or relatives, their home or garden might not be as child-friendly as your home. Children like to explore new surroundings, so make sure they don't go far on their own. Make sure you also check features such as ponds, barbecues and garden tools.

A few simple steps, such as nominating an adult to watch the children at a party, can reduce the risks.

Remember these safety tips if you and your family are visiting an area where there is water:

Go for a walk around the pool, beach, lake or river, looking for any hazards and

where the emergency equipment is. Ask if there is a lifeguard on duty and read the

water safety information signs at the beach. Consider taking a short (one or two-

hour) course in first aid and the key things to know in an emergency.

BORROW A BIKE SCHEME!

As part of the school's incentive to encourage pupils to come to school by bike Mrs Shrestha arranged for the school to purchase a number of bikes for pupils to borrow.







PARENT SURVEY-WHAT YOU WANTED AND WHAT WE HAVE DONE AS A RESULT...

You asked for more information regarding the work of Governors and as a result recent newsletters have informed you of Governor visits to the school. Governor updates will be a regular feature of the monthly newsletter so you are up to date of their impact.

You wanted to know if all bullying allegations/incidents were recorded. I can inform you that all bullying allegations/ concerns are recorded formally as a school and the Governing Body is informed of the school's actions and the outcome of our investigations on a termly basis. In fact the Governing Body received a report on bullying allegations on Monday July 4th where we shared how we record and report allegations. Please ask us if you would like to see our recording format.

As parents, a number of you felt that you did not know enough about how well your children are doing in school. A full report will be sent home shortly celebrating your child's achievements over the last academic year. However, we operate an open door policy and you are free to make an appointment to see your child's class teacher to discuss their progress or to view your child's books at any time. All you have to do is ask. There will also be an opportunity to view your child's books on: Thursday 14th July from 2:30pm. Please also visit the school hall at 2:00pm for a glimpse of the musical achievements of some of our pupils!

You were concerned that the surface of the playgrounds are inadequate. As a school we did try to receive additional funding for this but our playgrounds are not seen as critical. The playgrounds are on the school's action plan for improvement. However, both playgrounds will be given a new look for September 2016 through playground markings-watch this space!

The EYFS outside area has also been given a transformation with the addition of a digging area to encourage pupil's to plant flowers and herbs!
