Communication & Language

- Talk about themselves, their likes, dislikes and what makes them happy or sad
- Talk about their work, intentions and stories
- Initiate conversations in small and large groups
- Listen to others carefully, ask and answer questions appropriately
- Listen to stories, and accurately respond to what they ask and anticipate key events
- Two channelled attention, can listen and do
- Understands rhymes and can continue a string
- Use language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations
- Use past, present and future tenses in talk

Physical Development

- Continue with dance and gymnastics
- Understand the effects of exercise and food on our bodies
- Letter formation
- Number formation
- Three finger tripod pencil grip and correct use of scissors
- Develop correct sitting posture
- Learn to negotiate space in order to work harmoniously with others and to avoid accidents
- Handle small tools, e.g. pencils, brushes, construction, play dough safely and with increasing control
- Show increasing control over an object, pushing patting etc.
- Shows understanding for safety when tackling new challenges and considers and manages some risks

Philosophy, Religion & Ethics

- Develop moral values through stories
- Continue to show empathy for others by helping, sharing and comforting them
- Understand what they are and the reasons behind right and wrong
- Know their rights and responsibilities as well as feeling: good, proud of their work and themselves
- Show respect for other children's belongings and school property
- Listen to stories about Lord Krishna and other special people
- Share home celebrations with class
- Participate in school festivals, e.g. Snana Yatra, Father's Day
 Understand this term's school values, Courage and Gratitude

- <u>Literacy</u>
 - Listen to a range of stories. e.g. Pirates love underpants, The Rainbow Fish, Peter Pan, Little Red Riding Hood
 - Uses vocabulary and forms of speech that are increasingly influenced by their experiences of books
 - Recognise rhyming words
 - Link letters and sounds, sounding out and naming the letters of the alphabet
 - Use known words, initial and other dominate letter sounds in words to write
 - Form letters using anticlockwise movement
 - Children use their phonic knowledge to write words in ways that match their spoken sounds
 - Write some irregular common words
 - Write simple sentences that they and others can read

<u>Maths</u>

- Reads, writes and recites numbers to 20 and beyond
- Knows how to find one more and one less, more and fewer
- Simple addition and subtraction using objects
- Number bonds to 10
- Show awareness of similarities of shape and patterns in the environment
- Create simple repeating patterns
- Can describe their relative position, such as 'next to' and 'behind'
- Can estimate how many objects they can see and checks by counting
- Solves problems, including, doubling, halving and sharing
- Orders two items by weight of capacity
- Uses everyday language related to time
- Measure short periods of time in simple ways
- Use mathematical language to describe everyday objects

Development
