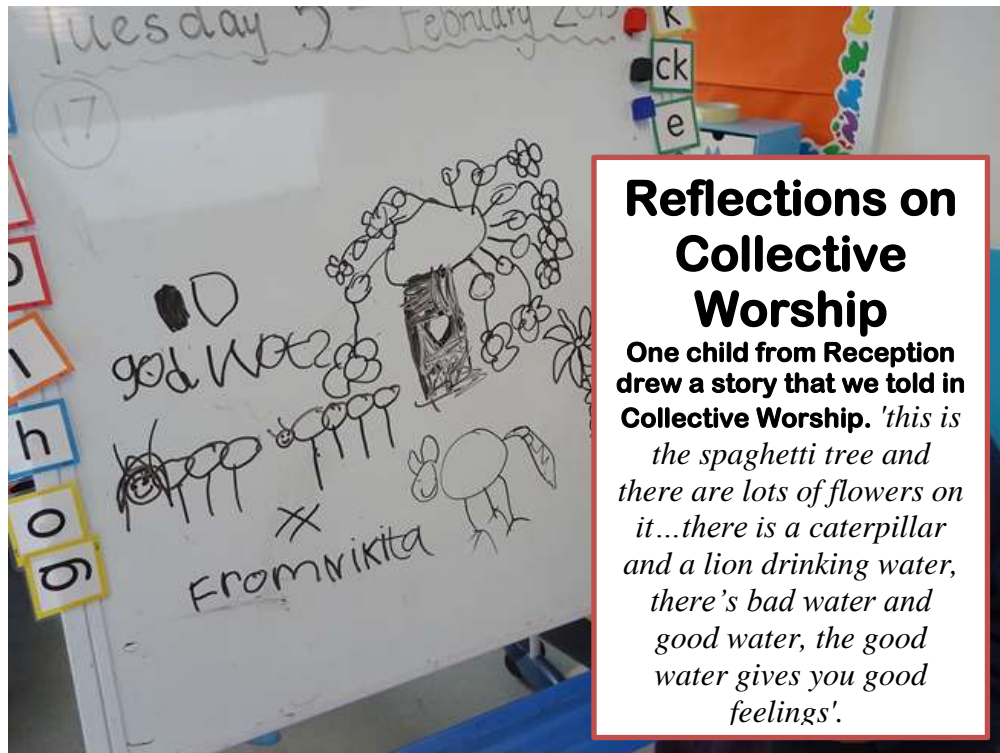

Home Learning Projects are not Competitions...please read this:

It is the time of term when home learning projects are handed in. Thank you for your effort in supporting your children to complete these.

I have noticed that there are some parents who are doing the project for their children – whilst we welcome your enthusiasm please do not create works of art for your child because it sets up a culture of competition which is not part of our ethos or vision for high quality learning. I noticed today how disappointed some children looked when parents brought in adult quality houses. They thought that their child efforts were not good enough.

Every piece of the home learning project should be by the children. If a model ends up messy, stuck with glue, not coloured in perfectly BUT it is by the children, then this is an Outstanding piece of home learning. If it is perfect, obviously made by an adult, this is not outstanding piece of home learning. Resist the temptation to do it for your child.

Projects are judged against this criteria – we want children's learning NOT adult learning.
